Last Week

Lynne M. Hocker spoke to the group about environmentally conscious historic renovations. Illustrating his talk with a PowerPoint presentation full of photos, Hocker showed how his team restored a 1775 log building using renewable energy sources. Placed on a 30-acre site dubbed "Whispering Creek," the building now is used as a corporate retreat. Thanks to help from a \$200,000 Pennsylvania state grant, the building has incorporated solar panels, wind turbines, LED light bulbs, and geothermal heating and cooling systems. It now produces twice as much energy as it consumes.

For those interested in figuring out how to make their home or business more energy efficient and environmentally benign, Hocker recommends the following first step: Before looking into how you can produce energy, you first have to look at how you can reduce the energy you currently use. Tax Relief!

A note from Secretary **Rick**: Haiti relief donations qualify for immediate tax relief.

The IRS alerted taxpayers who itemize

deductions that they may claim donations to charities providing earthquake relief in Haiti on their 2009 tax return. This special tax relief provision is available only for cash contributions made after January 11, 2010, and before March 1, 2010. For more tips about claiming a deduction and other information about providing relief to Haiti through a charitable organization, visit IRS.gov.

Other Relief Efforts

District 7020, which includes Haiti, has flown in 55 planes filled with more than 50,000 pounds of medical equipment and supplies into the cities of Pignon and Port-de-Paix to bypass logistical problems in the hard-hit capital of Port-au-Prince. "Rotary had an incredible infrastructure established before the quake, which has made our relief efforts very effective," says Dick McCombe, past district governor and Haiti liaison chair. "We're flying in supplies through backdoor channels and doing things a lot of agencies can't do."

Here to tell us about Meals on Wheels is Roger Dailey, president of the board of Meals on Wheels of Jefferson County.

Meals on Wheels of Jefferson County prepares and delivers a nutritious noontime meal to the homes of people in Jefferson County who are homebound or for any reason unable to prepare at least one balanced meal per day, regardless of age, income, infirmity, race, gender, or neighborhood. Meals on Wheels of Jefferson County is a basic-needs nonprofit organization of the United Way of the Eastern Panhandle.

Dailey has a long history of civic involvement. A native of Jefferson County, he retired from National Institutes of Health in 1999 after 35 years of service working for the Center of Information Technology. He has served on the Jefferson County Farmland Protection board, The Land Trust of the Eastern Panhandle, and the Jefferson County Agriculture Taskforce. Currently he is the president of South Jefferson Ruritan, vice president for the Jefferson County chapter of the National Active and Retired Federal Employees, Outreach Chairman for the Jefferson County Chapter of AARP, and Boy Scout district chairman for Jefferson County, West Virginia, and Clarke County, Virginia.

Last Week

Vice-resident Julie Siler introduced the program, "Women's Lacrosse at Shepherd University," presented by Head Coach Tammy Butler. Coach Butler was accompanied by Assistant Coach Dustin Robbins. Butler came to Shepherd University in June 2009 to build its first Varsity

Women's Lacrosse program. By way of background, Tammy explained that lacrosse originated with Native Americans as a game to prepare warriors for battle. Currently lacrosse ("lax" for short) is the fastest growing sport in the United States, with participants increasing at 20% per year. In 2008, there were about 29,000 players in more than 500 club and college men's and women's teams.

Coach Butler has initiated a four component "lax building program" consisting of: Team development; Campus involvement and buy in; Community involvement; and Service. Team development has resulted in recruitment of 18 players towards a goal of 25. She views Shepherd ideally situated in the Baltimore-District of Columbia-Ohio-New Jersey recruiting area. Campus involvement includes education of spectators through the use of "cheat sheets" on seats at games, outreach to the faculty and staff community, and "Lax for Cure" - fund raising with Relay for Life. Community involvement includes holding a February 27 "Annual Lax Day", establishing youth Lax games at half-time, holding the first "Lax Camp" from June 21-25, 2010, initiating an Annual Fish Fry, and initiating an "Oktoberfest" in Fall, 2010. Tammy indicated that the Lax Program is looking for service projects to supplement the forthcoming Kiwanis Toy Drive, Soup Kitchen, Clinic Camp, and Lax for Cure projects.

How can Shepherdstown Rotary help women's Lax at Shepherd? Tammy emphasized the importance of partnering in service projects, attending games, supporting Lax events, and spreading the word. The opening home game against Shenandoah University is scheduled for 4:00 pm on Tuesday, March 2, at Rams Stadium.

Questions for Coach Butler included: What are the differences between men's and women's lacrosse? Are scholarships available for lacrosse recruits? Are there any plans for a men's lacrosse team?
