Shepherd University Men's Basketball

Justin Namolik head coach

Today

We welcome Justin Namolik, head men's basketball coach at Shepherd University since April 2009. During the 2009-2010 season, Namolik led the Rams to a 9-19 overall record, 9-13 in conference. However, seven of those losses were by four points or less and the 2009-2010 squad consisted of 10 newcomers, eight of them freshman. Namolik projects that "with 10 returning players for the 2010-2011 season and another strong recruiting class, we will look to take a big step toward the top of the WVIAC."

And that projection isn't just theoretical; it's based on the solid proof of Namolik's earlier successes at Shepherd. As interim head coach for the 2008-2009 season, he led the Rams to a 13-16 overall mark with an 11-9 conference record, including wins over #22 Pitt-Johnstown, and over West Virginia State—the Yellow Jackets' only loss in the WVIAC regular season. As an assistant coach with the Rams from 2006 to 2008, he helped lead them to a 32-26 record, their first back-to-back winning seasons in 14 years. Thirty-three of the 37 student-athletes he has coached or recruited have graduated or are currently in school working toward their degrees.

Prior to Shepherd, Namolik was for three seasons the top assistant coach at Saint Vincent College in Pennsylvania, where he also played a vital role in recruiting. He helped lead the Bearcats to a 68-24 record and two "Sweet Sixteen" appearances in the NAIA Division II National Tournament. The 2004-2005 team finished the season ranked fourth in NAIA Division II, 25-5 overall, and 14-0 in the AMC, becoming only the second team in the 56year history of the conference to go undefeated in the regular season.

Town Run

Dr. Keith D. Alexander

Today

Our guest is Dr. Keith Alexander, visiting assistant professor of environmental studies at Shepherd University and the coordinator of Shepherd's Historic Preservation program.

After graduating from Penn State in 1992, Alexander worked in Washington, D.C., as an environmental policy analyst, and then went to graduate school. He received his masters in 1996 and his doctorate in 2003 in history from the University of Maryland. He has been involved in historic preservation efforts in West Virginia and in Germany, and his research interests include green historic preservation and service learning in preservation education. At Shepherd he teaches classes in architectural history, environmental studies, and historic preservation.

Dr. Alexander is secretary of the Friends of the Shepherdstown Riverfront, which is working on plans to revitalize the area where Town Run flows into the Potomac, and co-chair of the Historic Resources working group of the Rivers and Trails Conservation Assistance project. Town Run, also known as Falling Spring Branch, has long shaped Shepherdstown's history, including dictating the town's location and first industries. This morning Dr. Alexander will explore the cultural and natural history of this important stream, and link it to recent efforts to revitalize the waterfront.

Acupuncture: The Law of Five Elements

Michelle DeStefano

Today

Michelle DeStefano received her master's degree in acupuncture in 1988 from Traditional Acupuncture Institute—the oldest acupuncture school in the United States-and began her practice in Shepherdstown in 1999. Since then she has studied Toyo Hari, a unique form of Japanese acupuncture, with the same teachers for the last 10 years. Toyo Hari utilizes noninsertion techniques that provide effective, yet painless, results. One special quality about her Japanese teachers is that they are blind, so they offer a unique perspective in teaching the subtle evaluation skills it takes to assess the energetics of the body during the healing process. Acupuncture is energy medicine. Energy is what holds the integrity of our organs and bodies in place, and energy is what is responsible for the functioning of these organs.

DeStefano also practices needle insertion, what is more popularly known as Traditional Chinese Medicine, which most American acupuncture schools teach. Typically in this type of treatment, needles are inserted and retained for a time before being removed, and more than one person can be worked on at a time.

DeStefano's special interest is the mind/body/spiritual connection to healing. She finds that many people's physical complaints are in a large part due to deeper suffering—they feel disconnected from an inner sense of purpose. Some may feel stuck in an unfulfilling life; others may feel constant life pressures, anxiety, and a constant undercurrent of stress. Toyo Hari is a great modality for these types of treatments. Toyo Hari treatments typically last about 45 minutes to an hour are are gentle and relaxing. Only one person can be worked on at a time.

This morning DeStefano will introdduce The Law of the Five Elements, a description of the energetics involved in acupuncture. Understanding these laws not only allows people to understand the basic principles involved in an acupuncture treatment, but also empowers them to take better care of themselves.

Last Week

Dr. Keith Alexander, visiting assistant professor of environmental studies at Shepherd University and the coordinator of Shepherd's historic preservation program spoke about Shepherdstown's Town Run. The "invinsible stream" originates from springs near Morgan's Grove Park and is fed by 25 natural springs along its course. In his presentation, Dr. Alexander discussed times where the stream flooded Shepherdstown and other times where it "disappeared" during droughts. Historically the Town Run was used mainly to provide power, recreation, and fire protection for Shepherdstown. Today the run also provides natural stormwater management, and it gives a sense of natural beauty not found in many other towns.

Dr. Alexander also stressed the need to preserve Town Run for the future. Shepherd and the state of West Virginia are establishing programs to help keep it clean.
